Mentoring and scholarships are currently offered to all members, not only student chapter leaders. The Chapter Committee added this to the policy. I will need information to answer questions when asked if this is to remain as part of the policy.</p> <p>Each chapter is responsible for creating and maintaining their owasp.org chapter home page. There needs to be clearly defined timeframes for the creation of new chapter pages and updatings. Chasing 100+ chapters for the past 11 months should be proof of the need of a clearly defined policy. Chapter leaders need to consider the benefits for both the OWASP community and OWASP Foundation while fulfilling their responsibilities. It makes much more sense to make membership required for chapter leaders, especially since this rule and all activities chapter leaders engage in need to be aligned with the overall policies of the OWASP Foundation.</p> <p>> • Each chapter must have a minimum of 2 and a maximum of 5 leaders.</p> <p>The most appropriate number of leaders will depend on the chapter. Some chapters won't be able to find 2 leaders. Other chapters might need more than 5 leaders. There's no need to use the word "must" here. Rephrasing this as "should have a minimum of 2" would be more appropriate.</p> <p>When we started OWASP Japan, we used the London chapter as a reference and started with 2 leaders and some people on the advisory board and management team. This gave us support from a wide variety of different backgrounds and perspectives. There's no need to set the maximum number of chapter leaders at 5.</p> <p>> • Leaders should transition or rotate every 2-3 years and encourage fresh Leaders to step up and participate in the Chapter operations. Leader selection is at the Chapter's discretion.</p> <p>Using "may" instead of "should" is more appropriate. Having at least 2 leaders allows for a balanced approach but having the leadership changed every couple of years will make it difficult to maintain a strong, consistent, and focused initiative for the chapter.</p>			Modified - change text to indicate 5 official leaders, unofficially board members, etc okay

An OWASP email address should always be treated as an OWASP membership benefit and not be granted to non-members.</p> <p>The phrase "Chapter Committee" appears here for the first time, but it's unclear what it means. There should be an explanation for this term.</p> <p>> • Access to OWASP Foundation Shared Services</p> <p>Access to OWASP Foundation Shared Services should be considered as a chapter benefit and not a leadership benefit. 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Riotaro Okada			<p>Running a Chapter Discoverability</p> <p>Saying that this is "not required" but making it essentially forced with the rules is nonsense. Japanese people hardly use Meetup.com due to localization and support for the Japanese market. The chapters in Japan have been using Doorkeeper, a local service. We already have thousands of OWASP community members registered on this service and have been using it very smoothly and successfully.</p> <p>The small charge associated with using this service has been paid for personally by the chapter leaders. This is an appropriate operational expense. If the chapter leader requests and the chapter has the necessary budget remaining, the policies should allow these expenses to be reimbursed from the chapter budget.</p> <p>Moreover, these types of operational guidelines should not be listed in the policies. It's more appropriate to list software/service selection, and other operational guidelines should be listed in the handbook.</p> <p>> "If you use another platform, OWASP will not reimburse these expenses."</p> <p>The individual chapter decides which service to use, and as such, the expenses, in this case, should be paid for from the individual chapter budget.</p>			Modified - remove Meetup. com Modified - may not reimburse...	
Riotaro Okada			<p>Meetings and Activity Requirements</p> <p>> • Chapter activity information (date, time, and location) must be posted on the owasp.org chapter page before the event start date.</p> <p>Using "should" here instead of "must" is more appropriate. Posting chapter activity information on owasp.org is definitely important, but the current wording prevents posting information after the date. Also, in many cases, information is posted initially on SNS and event registration platforms with more detailed information and activity results posted on owasp.org after the date.</p> <p>>The Chapter Handbook[TBD: Needs Link] contains details of how to publish event information automatically when using the OWASP meeting scheduling platform.</p> <p>The Chapter Handbook is not available yet, so this comment is not necessary. Riotaro Okada			<p>Starting a New Chapter</p> <p>This would be a more realistic policy:</p> <p>"Create new chapter pages within ***30 days*** of GitHub access on the owasp.org website. Login into their owasp.org email account within ***7 days*** or they will need to log a support ticket via Contact Us to have a password recovery email sent to their registered email address."</p>			Accepted	

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Riotaro Okada			<p>Starting a city chapter</p> <p>There's no actual merit to using "must" in this clause. First of all, the definition of "city" is unclear. Does "city" refer to a political-administrative district, an economic spere, a cultural sphere? It's unclear what range we're talking about, and this leads to confusion.</p> <p>For reference, in Japan, there are 8 major regions, 47 prefectures, 20 ordinance-designated cities, within each of which there are around 10 to 20 wards and over 1700 municipalities throughout the country. All of these could be referred to as "cities" in English. Saying that chapter leaders "must" reside within 80 km (50 miles) doesn't make any sense since this distance might be inappropriate or unrealistic based on the country or region.</p> <p>As you know, with the effects of the pandemic this year, borderless communication and collaborations between regions have increased. Also, the current shift towards online meetings will probably continue in the future. It's not productive to have such strict policies on geographical restrictions and the location of chapter leaders. The goal should be to make it as easy for the right people to come together, regardless of geographical differences, and empower community activities across a wide variety of regions.</p>			Rejected	
Riotaro Okada			<p>Renaming a Chapter</p> <p>This should be changed to "Naming a Chapter." I can understand the thinking behind using "cities" as a basis for naming chapters but having a strict policy like this makes no sense. The naming should be looked at individually based on each team's application to start a chapter.</p> <p>The meaning of having a chapter in a specific area can best be understood by the local people there. The population of engineers and benefits from collaborations between engineers of different areas is different from region to region. The naming of a chapter can have a huge impact on people's motivation to participate in chapter activities actively.</p> <p>For instance, in Japan, we have chapters such as OWASP KANSAI and OWASP KYUSHU based on broader regional areas. Maybe this approach is similar to the OWASP Bay Area chapter. Within these areas, multiple large cities historically have been competing against each other. To ensure smoother collaboration between people living in these regions, the local teams decided to form chapters based on the regions and not individual cities. This approach has been effective in attracting engineers from across the region and contributing to the successful operations and activities of the chapter.</p>			Modified - Naming a Chapter, other items covered by upcoming regional policy	

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Riotaro Okada			<p>Regional chapters</p> <p>Although the wording has improved from the initial draft, some of the wording still gives off a rude impression.</p> <p>“Regional chapters have never been defined by any prior policy” is not appropriate. Regional chapters were formed were to help areas that could benefit from OWASP activities but had no one to encourage and facilitate activities there.</p> <p>Here in Japan, OWASP Japan has successfully helped start and facilitate activities for many local chapters.</p> <p>Being a non-English speaking country in the far east, Japan doesn't have a lot of people who can participate in the Global AppSec and communicate comfortably in English. Despite this, the Japanese translation team has actively worked on localizing OWASP documents and collaborating with local companies and government agencies. As a result, they've had some tremendous achievements, and Japan, a country with one of the most if not the most access to owasp.org.</p> <p>We've also successfully brought some Japanese companies such as Rakuten, Panasonic, SCSK, Cybozu, and UBsecure onboard as Corporate Sponsors, specifically because these companies were motivated to support Japanese translation and localization activities through the alignment with OWASP Japan. (A lot of these sponsors were very disappointed when the alignment system was canceled. Although I strongly object to the cancellation of the alignment system for sponsorships, this is a separate topic)</p> <p>Although the local chapter leaders in Japan have earnestly engaged in pushing forward local chapter activities, their difficulty communicating in English makes it challenging for them to participate in these kinds of policy reviews. OWASP Japan, over the years, has acted as a bridge with local chapter leaders to help overcome these language barriers and ensure smoother communication.</p> <p>Our approach has not gone against the “Regional chapters hold no powers over any other chapters” wording in this policy, but this wording is too direct and too strong considering the supportive and collaborative activities of a regional chapter.</p> <p>We should acknowledge that “Local chapter may respect that regional chapters have supported local chapters directly or indirectly for many years.” Including this type of comment would be better.</p> <p>In the future as well, especially for non-English regions, co-organizing AppSec Conference as we have held before in Tokyo, participation in the chapter leader meeting (like Town Hall) as well as translation and localization activities would be more effective if done through regional chapters, and are regional chapters are necessary for allowing a wide variety of companies to be involved in sponsorship and community collaborations.</p>			Rejected
